





Right now in Congress the Senate and House Appropriations Committee members are considering funds for Cliff Dam a portion of the Bureau of Reclamation's Central Arizona Project.

Some 95% of the nation's Sonoran Desert streamside wildlife and bald eagle habitat has been destroyed by government dams (see map below). Cliff Dam would destroy critical habitat of the world's only desert-nesting Bald Eagles.

#### DEATH OF AN ECOSYSTEM



#### Ideas for your letter:

1. Cliff Dam would drown thousands of acres of valuable wildlife and eagle habitat. It could push to the brink of extinction a tiny, isolated, Sonoran Desert Bald Eagle population. Only thirteen pairs of these unique desert-adapted eagles produced young last year.
2. Cliff Dam would eliminate 10 miles out of 50 miles of Wild and Scenic river designation from Arizona's only "Wild and Scenic" river, the Verde.
3. The real purpose of the dam is to create a commercial riverbed real estate development in downtown Phoenix. Rebuilding the two existing Verde River dams for "flood control" would accomplish this dubious purpose with less environmental destruction and at less cost to the U.S. taxpayer (see map).
4. Cliff Dam and the Central Arizona Project is an outrageous waste of dollars and the proposed Cliff Dam portion has an illegal 1000%, \$1.0 billion cost overrun.
5. Storing (recharging) water underground would yield twice as much water as Cliff at practically no taxpayer cost.

# Save A National Biological Treasure

## INLAND GALAPAGOS CRADLE OF EVOLUTION

Mt. Graham is not simply an issue about squirrels. Mt. Graham is an inland Galapagos surrounded by a desert sea. More than 18 unique plants and animals, including three mammals, two mollusks, three plants, and many insects have evolved into unique species and subspecies since glacial recession 11,000 years ago — when Arizona was a damp, cool, boreal, spruce-fir forest like that found in central and northern Canada.

Mt. Graham possesses more life zones than any other isolated mountain in the U.S. It ascends from a 2,900 ft. desert floor to a 10,700 ft. boreal or Hudsonian (northern Canada) life zone. The diminutive 615-acre ancient, spruce-fir forest at Mt. Graham's summit is the southernmost spruce-fir forest in North America.

Mt. Graham's vigorous summer monsoons, winter rains, and snowstorms sustain a mountain possessing more life zones and vegetative communities than any other solitary mountain in North America. By Arizona standards it is a rainforest. By astronomy standards it is a lemon. UofA, having battled for and lost control of Mauna Kea to the U. of Hawaii, would destroy this natural wonder, rather than swallow their pride and opt for the superior Mauna Kea site.

## NATIONAL BIOLOGICAL TREASURE AT STAKE

What also makes Mt. Graham biologically extraordinary is that it is the co-mingling point for the flora and fauna of the continent's southernmost Hudsonian forest with those of the Mexican subtropics. Mt. Graham is an uncommonly wet range by Arizona standards (making astronomy marginal). It hosts 14 perennial streams and 3 unique high-altitude ciénegas. Ciénegas are wet meadows with bog-like vegetation that support richer flora and fauna than the surrounding conifer forest. In one day a bear foraging on Mt. Graham can ascend or descend through life zones which are the equivalent to walking from the Mexican border to the Hudson Bay.

Government studies show the telescope project would ecologically destroy over 100 acres of the tiny, fragile 615-acre virgin, spruce-fir summit ecosystem. It would fragment, subdivide and degrade much more of it. This 615-acre Hudsonian (boreal) life zone contributes significantly to Mt. Graham's evolutionary and biological uniqueness.

For the Mt. Graham red squirrel to survive the winter, cones must be stored green and unopened in food caches beside fallen trees. If forest canopy is removed for telescope construction, wind and sun will reduce the adjacent forest's humidity (edge effect). The stored cones then open and the seeds are destroyed or lost.

## FACT VS. FICTION ON MT. GRAHAM

**1. UofA claim:** *There are no alternatives to Mt. Graham.* **Fact:** Graham was ranked 38th (least desirable) of 59 western U.S. sites by a recent study. A recent study for placement of the world's largest telescope, chose Mauna Kea, hands down, over a mediocre Graham. Monsoon-and-snowstorm-plagued Mt. Graham with 35 inches of rainfall and 73% humidity was considered suitable only half the year. Mauna Kea with six inches of rainfall and 25% humidity was suitable 3/4 of the year. UofA would destroy a national biological treasure to accommodate driving convenience and to avoid sharing with other institutions at occupied sites. Both the German and Vatican collaborators poised for Mt. Graham admit equivalent or better sites exist elsewhere. A sour grapes UA, having lost control of Mauna Kea in a 60s turf war with U. of Hawaii, would now destroy a world-heritage ecosystem and defer to a technically inferior site.

**2. UofA claim:** *The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) was never bypassed, just "accelerated."* **The USFS wrote an environmental impact statement (EIS).** **Fact:** The Congressional exemption from NEPA nullified all written Mt. Graham USFS impact statements and the environmental rules applying to them. UofA lobbied NEPA exemption because they knew the deficient USFS EIS failed to consider non-destructive telescope sites as required by NEPA law. This deficiency would have been challenged in court by conservationists.

**3. UofA claim:** *The project has never been shown to be harmful.* **Fact:** UofA has spent millions conniving to exempt their extremely harmful project from all environmental law. Besides lobbying exemption from NEPA, their Mt. Graham legislation incorporated a fraudulent, illegal

endangered species study according to Congressional testimony given by the General Accounting Office, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Arizona Game and Fish Dept. The FWS official who ordered his biologists to write a study approving the project, under Congressional cross-examination, admitted he broke the endangered species law. Now that the project is known to be in violation of the Endangered Species Act (ESA), UofA attorneys in court are claiming Congress meant to exempt the project from ESA as well as NEPA. All legislators connected with the legislation have emphatically stated ESA was in no way meant to be weakened.

**4. UofA claim:** *There are 11,000 acres of squirrel habitat and UofA needs only 8.6 acres.* **Fact:** UofA would destroy, or fragment 1/4 of the squirrel's best habitat. UofA says they need 24 acres, not 8.6, for their minimum viable project. "Edge" effect from 24 acres destroys 130 acres and fragments even more. Most of the project is within (1) the summit's priceless 615-acre old-growth, boreal forest and (2) the 472 acres of "best" squirrel habitat. UA's 11,000 acre figure erroneously includes thousands of heavily logged, valueless or marginal acres. Squirrel numbers have varied from 99 to 328 depending on food supply. Each time astronomers destroy old-growth "critical habitat" the population comes closer to the extinction threshold during food shortages.

**5. UofA claim:** *It has been a needlessly prolonged 4-10 year planning process so it's O.K. to circumvent NEPA.* **Fact:** It was 2 yrs., 4 mos. UofA submitted their first (18-scope) proposal in June '84. The USFS environmental study (DEIS) came out Oct. '86 approving 5 scopes on High Peak. UofA adamantly refused this for the next two years. They insisted 7 scopes was their minimum viable project. They also insisted on building in the extremely vulnerable Emerald Peak habitat. The AZ delegation intensified their intimidation of the USFS and USFWS over the next two years, forcing the unlawful selection of Emerald Peak. The USFS capitulated in late '87 and the USFWS in mid '88. Congress unknowingly incorporated the fraudulent, illegal USFWS Emerald Peak endangered species study into the notorious NEPA exemption rider of Oct. 88.

**6. UofA claim:** *Hunting has harmed the squirrel.* **Fact:** All biologists who have worked on Mt. Graham concur that habitat destruction is the issue, not hunting. This 8 oz. "mini-squirrel" is virtually non-hunted (one found in a hunter's possession in past 23 years).

**7. UofA claim:** *Abert's squirrel introduction has hurt the Red Squirrel.* **Fact:** Both species live side-by-side in separate ecological niches on various mountain ranges in the Southwest. Abert's prefers open, lower altitude, Ponderosa pine, and being unable to cache food for winter, fails in snow-covered, higher, old-growth boreal red squirrel habitat where the scopes would go.

**8. UofA claim:** *Only UofA tree-planting and research dollars can save the squirrel.* **Fact:** Tree-planting is a public relations gimmick. It requires 150-400 years to restore suitable old-growth. Research is exemplary but cannot replace "critical habitat" destroyed by astronomers. The dilemma is short-term (100+ yr.) species survival, not long-term forest recovery.

**9. UofA claim:** *UofA "monitoring" research will measure construction impact.* **Fact:** Because the squirrels look alike and are unmarked it cannot be determined whether the project fatally displaces or destroys more than six squirrels annually- the congressionally allowable annual project "kill." The UofA behavioral study using unmarked squirrels is public relations

hype, like tree-planting. The study was rejected by the scientific community due to its flawed control areas and unmarked animals.


**10. UofA claim:** *UofA claims the presence of squirrels in the lower altitude mixed conifer justifies deforestation of the summit's tiny old-growth, spruce-fir forest.* **Fact:** Dense, humid old-growth canopy, whether in the higher, spruce-fir or in lower, mixed conifer, is vital. The food and shelter of both habitats are important. The heavily logged mixed conifer will require 150-400 years to develop suitable old-growth. Because some squirrels survive in fragments of unlogged old-growth mixed conifer, this does not justify destroying virgin, old-growth spruce-fir in the federally designated "critical habitat."

**11. UofA claim:** *UofA claims the Apache cannot protest the project because they were mailed a questionnaire years ago asking if they had objections.* **Fact:** The Apache Elders and Tribal Council in July 1990 voted unanimously to oppose the project as a violation of their religion and culture. In Phoenix in 1987 the Pope told Native Americans to "...preserve and keep alive your cultures, languages, values and customs..." In late 1990 Vatican, UofA and Max Planck bulldozers proceeded to desecrate Apache holy ground on Mt. Graham.








— ancient, virgin spruce-fir forest  
— would be degraded or destroyed by UofA




— firelane or trees blown over  
— federal red squirrel "critical habitat"


Mt. Graham possesses more life zones than any other isolated U.S. mountain. **1986: INTIMIDATED AGENCIES APPROVE 5 TELESCOPES** Under intense Arizona congressional delegation pressure, USFS & USFWS OK'd five scopes on High Peak. UofA refused and from 1986-1988 demanded more scopes and land while the delegation further pressured the agencies into breaking endangered species law and approving the ecologically sensitive Emerald Peak habitat.



**1988: CONGRESSIONAL GIVEAWAY** Congress approved seven telescopes in the extremely vulnerable Emerald Peak region. Three scopes were totally exempt from NEPA and used the USFWS' fraudulent endangered species study. The entire western summit would be destroyed and UofA is given a beachhead for expansion eastward.



**1984: UofA PROPOSES TO DESTROY ENTIRE FOREST** White areas represent habitat UofA would destroy or degrade. In 1984 UofA requested 18 telescopes at Emerald Peak, Hawk Peak, and High Peak – which would more than obliterate the ecosystem.

Walter Jones**, Chairman, Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee. Jones/Studds are the endangered species watchdogs of Congress. Please ask the above to: (1) immediately undertake lawful endangered species studies, and (2) to enact legislation clarifying that all provisions of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) apply on Mt. Graham as was assured by Congress when they passed the Mt. Graham rider in 1988. The Bush Administration claims the rider exempted the project from ESA.

**President George Bush**, White House, Wash. D.C. 20500. Ask him to stop his efforts to remove the project from the provisions of the Endangered Species Act; and to allow a lawful, non-fraudulent endangered species study to now be undertaken.

**President, Ohio State Univ.**, 190 N. Oval Mall, Columbus OH 43210. **President, Univ. of Arizona**, Tucson AZ 85721. # — THE BATTLE INTENSIFIES — MT. GRAHAM CAN BE SAVED



*Mt. Graham has more vegetation life zones than any solitary U.S. mountain. Since glacial recession 10,000 years ago, many subalpine plants and animals found nowhere else in the world have evolved on the virgin spruce-fir forest on its summit. This tiny 400-600 acre forest treasure-trove is now being systematically piecemealed and fragmented by UA even though superior observatory sites exist elsewhere.*

## Dear Friends,

On July 28, 1994, a coalition of 18 environmental organizations<sup>1</sup> won an injunction against further telescope construction on Mt. Graham until lawful environmental studies are performed. At 5 AM on Dec. 7, 1993, under intense secrecy, the University of Arizona (UA) chainsawed hundreds of old-growth trees in a single day. On July 28, however, the court stopped the UA chainsaws as they were headed for more.

The illegally cut site is part of the 600-acre spruce-fir forest that crowns

Graham's 10,700 ft. summit. Since glacial recession 10,000 years ago, many plants and animals found nowhere else<sup>2</sup> in the world, and of immeasurable ecological and evolutionary significance, have evolved in this diminutive, fragile spruce-fir forest. The Dec. 7 covert assault was designed to prevent environmental and Native American opponents from having time to enter court to halt the illegal deforestation of a site outside the area Congress exempted from U.S. environmental law.

The reason for the illegal clear-cutting was that UA, in their 1988

rush to lobby their exemptions from U.S. environmental law, failed to do their science homework. In 1988, UA told Congress the mountain had been studied to death and that their German partners would leave them if they had to wait for completion of environmental studies. In a \$1,000,000 lobbying blitz, UA tacked a rider on another bill and rushed it through in the final hours of Congress without hearings or public testimony. In 1993, five years later, UA admitted they lobbied Congress for the worst place on the mountain.<sup>3</sup>

Astonishingly, UA ignored the

careful 1982-87 studies of the National Optical Astronomy Observatory<sup>4</sup> (NOAO, 20 leading U.S. astronomy universities). NOAO noted visibility problems with Graham's flat topography, dense old-growth, monsoon and snowstorm-plagued weather, and fewer suitable viewing nights. The studies found 37 continental U.S. sites superior to Mt. Graham, and Hawaii's Mauna Kea clearly superior. NOAO jettisoned their Mt. Graham plans and moved to Hawaii and Chile.


**Why your financial help is needed in our litigation:**

**1.** Help us stop this nightmare! Though two small telescopes (Vatican and German) have been built, 7, 12<sup>5</sup> or more telescopes are planned. German and Vatican astronomers have admitted they have alternatives.<sup>6</sup> The illegal, "Pearl Harbor" clear-cut was for telescope #3, the near-bankrupt Columbus binocular telescope. The Columbus has lost 50% of its partners and UA now says only half the telescope can be built. Twenty-eight North American institutions have already abandoned or rejected the Mt. Graham scandal because of its "unacceptable" visibility, cloud cover, deep snow, or irreconcilable Native American and environmental problems. No U.S. universities remain as partners.

**2.** UA lawyers told the court that if UA must now comply with U.S. environmental law, it "threatens a breakup of the international coalition and...that [the Columbus] telescope may be placed outside the U.S." UA also says that if no Columbus is built, the entire Mt. Graham project would not be cost-effective and would collapse. UA can easily find partners at other sites. For example, Mexico has offered to join Columbus at what both claim is a world-class site in Mexico.



*At 5:00 AM, Dec. 7, 1993, UA with FS/FWS collusion carried out a top secret clear-cut strike upon a small, vulnerable spruce-fir forest on the summit of Mt. Graham—an ecosystem of immeasurable ecological and evolutionary significance. UA hurriedly cut the trees in one day and left them lifeless in the snow. The secrecy and haste was to prevent citizens from having time to enter court to stop a deforestation in violation of environmental law.*



*Monsoons and snowstorms frequently enshroud Mt. Graham making costly astronomy. UA ignored the mid-80's studies of 20 leading U.S. universities showing 32 better U.S. sites, a clearly superior Hawaii, and warnings about Graham's flat topography and dense old-growth. Belated UA studies now show UA chose the worst site on Mt. Graham: flat and heavily forested.*

3. Government studies<sup>7</sup> showed that the proposed city of telescopes would destroy 25% of the endangered Mt. Graham red squirrel's best 472 acres of spruce-fir habitat, critical to its long-term survival. Not only does UA endeavor to build in the heart of this tiny, fragile old-growth ecosystem, the feeder roads to the proposed telescope sites will permanently fragment remaining critical forest remnants.<sup>8</sup>

4. San Carlos Apache Medicine people, spiritual leaders, and three tribal councils have declared the telescopes "an act of profound desecration and a serious violation of Apache traditional religious beliefs." In the Apaches' lawsuit, UA lawyers argued that they were exempt from U.S. cultural and religious protection laws as well as U.S. environmental laws.

5. UA's 1988 rider represents the first peacetime exemption<sup>9</sup> from all U.S. environmental law. A project based on such a precedent must be stopped.



*In six of the last seven years surveys showed more squirrels around the illegal clear-cut. Days before the secret strike, however, a hush-hush study, lacking peer review or public announcement or distribution, alleged the squirrels had abandoned this illegally clear-cut area, intimating they would never return there — science fiction biology.*



Mt. Graham's tiny, fragile spruce-fir summit is a primitive, unlogged, undeveloped, seldom visited ecosystem. Weather closed it to humans most of the year prior to astronomy. Besides deforestation and ecosystem fragmentation, telescopes would open it to year-round trucks, cars, personnel and tourist buses, snowblowers, helicopters, generators, tree windthrow, tree-topping, disease, and fire. Telescope feeder and access roads increase squirrel roadkills and losses from predators, block wildlife dispersal, gene transfer, food search etc. Telescopes bring thousands of days of astronomy and construction personnel all year long. UA/FS boast of busing in, at minimum, 10,000 astrotourists annually, into a remote ecosystem which saw but a handful of rugged, summer-only campers.
